- Describe key terms and concepts used for analyzing the phonological and grammatical-syntactic structure of ancient Greek discourse, based on traditional grammar.
- Identify and analyze the basic morpho-syntactic structures of an ancient Greek text.
- Understand the significance of the core vocabulary of Attic prose and its use in ancient Greek texts.
- Classify an unseen prose text according to genre, recognizing its type based on the style and vocabulary of the text.
- Translate unseen texts from Attic prose with simple linguistic structure into correct Modern Greek, applying methods of scientific translation.
- Analyze and interpret ancient Greek texts, having developed basic skills by applying philological methods.
