Upon completion of the course, the students should be able to:

- to understand that Byzantium, although chronologically coincides with the Middle Ages, however it is not fully identified as a medieval state, as it was in many areas one of the most advanced states of the medieval era.
- to understand that Byzantium, although it was the heir and successor of the Roman Empire in state organisation and law, differs from it in terms of the Christian faith and Greek education and culture.
- to apprehend the great contribution of Byzantium in dealing with the Arab threat from the East (7<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> c.), as well as other hostile peoples on the Danube front, on the Haemus peninsula.
- to distinguish the difference that exists between the feudal organisation of Western Europe, the *feud*, and the system of Byzantine *pronoia*, especially in the Late period.
- to know important milestones of Byzantine History, but also basic aspects in the fields of state administration, government and institutions, ecclesiastical organisation, society and economy, education and culture of Byzantium.
- to know the main sources (historiographical, chronographic, etc.) of the Byzantine era.
- to know and use basic textbooks of Byzantine History.

### 3. COURSE CONTENT

1. Part I. The Byzantine Empire is presented from the founding of Constantinople in 324 during the reign of Constantine the Great (324-337) until the final fall to the Ottoman Turks in 1453. a) the geographical area, b) the capital Constantinople, c) the provinces, are examined.
2. The peoples who lived within the borders of the Empire and the neighbouring people.
3. The most important events, which marked its more than a thousand years course, during the Early period (4<sup>th</sup>-7<sup>th</sup> c.), with emphasis to the raids of hostile peoples on the Danube front (Goths, Huns, Avars, Slavs and Bulgarians).
4. Middle Byzantine period (7<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> c.), with special reference to the appearance and extension of the Arabs in the regions of Byzantine Empire (Syria, Palestine, Egypt).
5. Late Byzantine period (13<sup>th</sup>-15<sup>th</sup> c.).
6. Part II. Sub-issues/sectors of Byzantine History are developed, such as the ecclesiastical organisation.
7. The economy (agricultural and urban) and the fiscal (income-expenses) of the State.
8. The social stratification and the political and imperial idea.
9. The central and provincial administration.
10. The defence and the army.
11. Byzantine Archaeology and Art (Architecture, Sculpture, Painting).
12. Education and culture. The radiation of Byzantium to the peoples of the Haemus peninsula, to the West and to Russia.
13. Recapitulation and resolving questions.
