1. The evolution of Cultural Studies. Basic concepts in Cultural Studies: culture/civilization, ideology, hegemony, authority, high/popular culture, representation, identity/otherness.
2. Textual approaches in Cultural Studies: Semiotics, Narratology, Deconstruction/Postmodernism.
3. The Frankfurt School and the term “culture industry”.
4. Ideology and modern Greek literature: poetry and prose in the service of constructing national identity in the 19th century.
5. Popular and folk culture.
6. Issues of Imagology: The Other in modern Greek literature.
7. Gender and sexuality in modern Greek literature.
8. The city as text: representations of the city in modern Greek prose (19th-20th century).
9. Intersemiotic translation: From modern Greek novels to cinema and television.
10. Networks of reception and dissemination of modern Greek literature (19th-21st century): from publication by subscription to Cyberliterature.
11. Power and modern Greek literature: The critique of post-war literature on the hegemonic discourse of the post-civil war state.
12. Youth subculture in modern Greek literature.
13. Recap and clarification of questions, student feedback on the course.
