Athena Syriatou is Associate Professor of Modern and Contemporary European History at the Department of History and Ethnology of Democritus University of Thrace. She has been Director of the Laboratory of Modern and Contemporary History since 2018. She was born in Athens. She received her undergraduate degree from the Department of English Language and Literature at the National and Kapodistrian University of Athens. She continued her postgraduate studies (MA and PhD) at University College London in European and British History. She worked as a researcher and writer at the Deutsches Historisches Museum on three research projects: *Mythen der Nationen* I, II, III. She worked at the Hellenic Open University from 1999 to 2024 as an Associate Professor in the ‘European Civilization’ undergraduate program as well as in the ‘Public History’ postgraduate program. She was the scientific director of the digital program "Observatory for the Greek Revolution of 1821" (worth €485,000). <https://observatory1821.he.duth.gr/en/home-english> 2020-2023. Her research interests focus on topics of social and cultural history in contemporary Europe, particularly Britain, such as nationalism and identities through education in the 20th century, and the uses of memory and public history. She also studies topics related to the historiography of the British Empire and post-colonial society. She has published books, articles, and chapters in collective volumes on the above topics in Greece and abroad. She is a member of the editorial board of the journal *Historein ejournals* and a member of numerous historical associations. As director of the Laboratory of Modern and Contemporary History, she has organized international and pan-Hellenic conferences.
